





Pelham Chases Space Program Hosts an Evening with Astronaut Leland Melvin

On October 3, the Pelham Chases Space program, a year-long, community-wide celebration of STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering, and Math) hosted an evening with "Chasing Space" author Leland Melvin. Local events throughout the year will include book discussions at the Pelham Public Library, related movies at the Pelham Picture House, various author talks, art exhibitions, astronaut food challenge, rocket building and more. Melvin, a former pro football player and a retired NASA astronaut, spoke to the sold-out auditorium, encouraging students to study STEAM subjects (Science, Technology, Engineering, Arts, and Math.) He asserted that everything has an artistic piece to it, that math and music are the only absolutes, and that music affects both sides of the brain.

When Melvin was growing up in Lynchburg, Virginia, he was a fan of the show Star Trek, which, for the first time in television history, had a Black woman, Nichelle Nichols, as co-star, and remembers seeing Neil Armstrong walk on the moon. While many kids at that time wanted to be astronauts, Melvin did not. His role model



was Arthur Ashe, the first Black man to excel as a professional tennis player. Even though Mr. Melvin chose to play a different sport, football, Ashe's success inspired him.

Melvin's interest in science was sparked in a very unusual way. His father and educator, as was Melvin's mother, bought a bread company's old truck. Melvin helped him rewire it, put in propane, and install bunk beds to convert it into a camper. In doing so, he learned how to repurpose stuff with vision and sweat equity and bits of mechanical, electrical, and chemical engineering. Another time, his mother gave him a

chemistry set, with which he caused an explosion in their living room! Clearly, his parents were keen on encouraging his curiosity and creativity.

In addition to encouraging kids to study STEAM subjects, Melvin also encouraged them to always keep trying. When he was a kid in Lynchburg, Virginia, Melvin was a big fan of two

books, The Little Engine That Could and Curious George Mr. Melvin played football in high school and continued into college thanks to his coach, Jimmy Green, who "always had a back," just like the man in the yellow hat in Curious George. Because of his support, Melvin knew it was important to keep trying, just like the little engine that could. This was especially evident during the homecoming game at his high school when he dropped the ball in the end zone. His coach, who "had his back," told him that he believed in him and told him to get back out there and do it again. Even the quarterback didn't



want to throw it to him, but Melvin ran down the sideline and caught the ball!

Someone having his back and his refusal to give up recurred several times in Melvin's life and were keys to his success. After working on an optical fiber sensor to monitor the X33 vehicle's integrity, he got a call to be an astronaut. While doing spacewalk training in Russia in a 5,000,000-gallon pool, he was lowered on a platform into the water but did not have the pad in his helmet that would protect his ears from the pressure. After emergency surgery on his ears, another "man in the yellow hat," the head

James Lauria, Recipient of the John L. Marshall Award; Nick Florio Hired As New Town Clerk; Halloween Parade on October 28

At their October meeting on October 2, the Town Council approved Local Law #2 of 2023, overriding the tax cap that was established by Municipal Law 3 (c).

According to the Fly-car Stats Deputy Supervisor Rae Szymanski received from Empress Ambulance, there were forty-five mutual aid calls in Pelham, forty in Pelham Manor, one on I-95, and two on the Hutchinson River Parkway. The average response for the BLS (Basic Life Support) vehicle backing up the fly-car was ten minutes and ten seconds. The fly-car arrived 88% of the time in seven minutes and under and 96% of the time in eight minutes and under.

According to Councilwoman McLoughlin in her Recreation Department Report, there were thirty-five senior trips to medical appointments and a trip to for the seniors to Arthur Avenue. Also, after-school sports and other activities are in full swing and very well attended, winter basketball registration will open at the end of October, and the Halloween Parade will be on Saturday, October 28, at 4 p.m.

She also announced that the recipient of the John L. Marshall Award, given annually to a community member who, through volunteering, contributes significantly to the recreation department and the youth of the community, is James Lauria, a retired Pelham police sergeant and the son-in-law of Dr. Marshall.

Councilwoman McLoughlin reported that the AED Machines (Automated External Defibrillators) have arrived and will be set at Ingalls, Franklin, and Prospect Fields. Pictures and descriptions will be put on the website, and all coaches will be made aware of the devices' locations.

The recreation department is working with the public schools regarding parking at Glover Field, which has been difficult, especially during weekends. There will be new "No Parking" areas and police will be ticketing people parking on the grass. There is parking available above Friendship Field accessible from Imperia Drive, and Pelham Manor police will be monitoring that. Additionally, there is parking in an uncovered lot that is adjacent to the Target parking area.

Councilwoman Burke gave the Legal Committee report and announced that as of October 10, there is a new court clerk, Nick Florio, a long-time Pelham resident. She then reported that, according to the September Receiver

of Taxes Report, the total taxes received was \$27,437.639.20; most of this, \$27,196,231.65, was from school taxes. For a complete accounting, visit www.youtube.com/watch?v=s5xpnO-hkol0&t=616s.

Councilwoman Curtin gave the Library Report. Novel Night, a huge fundraising effort by Friends of the Town of Pelham Public Library, was a great success. Over 500 people attended, and there were dozens of theme parties. K-Day was held on September 23, and the rainy weather necessitated the moving of the petting zoo to inside the library! There were 134 new library cards issued, with over 400 children visiting between 10:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m. Councilman Curtin concluded her report by announcing upcoming events, including Demystifying Medicare on October 12, Defensive Driving on October 14, and Intro to Babysitting for those who are 11 and up. For more information and to register for the Defensive Driving course, call the library at 914-738-1234.

Supervisor O'Laughlin reported that the Toonerville Music Festival, though on a rainy day, was fun. Also, he, as well as the Town Controller, Samantha Losurdo, and Ruthann DeSimone, Supervisor McLaughlin's Administrative Assistant, met with the accountants on September 20, who were happy with the town's progress over the past three years; the financial statements will be available on the town's website.

Supervisor O'Laughlin and Deputy Supervisor Rae Szymanski had an ambulance meeting on September 28, which included fire and police department representatives, to discuss the contract drawn up by the town's attorney, Thomas Kleinberger, whose work on the contract was highly praised by Supervisor McLaughlin. Additionally, Councilwoman Curtin, Ms. DeSimone, and Supervisor McLaughlin had a meeting about the grant for the Daronco Townhouse and will be submitting the changes the town wants to make to the Historic Preservation representatives to make sure that their plans will be permitted. Also, Supervisor McLaughlin finished working on the grant for the ambulance and sent it immediately to the senator's and assemblywoman's offices as there is an ambulance that is now available for the town to purchase. Finally, Supervisor McLaughlin and two council members attended the WMOA (Westchester Municipal Officials Association) dinner at The Modern in New Rochelle. Innovative housing topics were discussed.

my extensive experience, legal expertise, and proven track record. During my eight years on the bench, I presided over numerous trials, rendered vital legal decisions, and provided fair and effective service to both Pelham residents, litigants and the attorneys appearing before me.

My roots in Pelham extend deep, as I have resided here for 34 years. My wife, Mary Beth, and I have celebrated 25 years of marriage, and our son, Gianfranco, a proud Pelham school gradu-

ate, currently attends St. John's University.

It is crucial to recognize that winning an election and donning a black robe do not inherently translate into a competent Judge. Competence in this role is honed through courtroom experience. From the Superintendent of Schools

As we continue to grapple with the aftereffects of the horrifying terror attacks perpetrated in Israel, we wanted to make you aware of a number of social media posts and statements attributed to Hamas that threatened violence in the U.S. on October 13. To be clear, these statements and posts did not reference Pelham or any other specific community and there is no reason to believe any of our students, staff or community members are in danger.

With that being said, in an abundance of caution, we advised both the Pelham and Pelham Manor Police Departments and are in regular contact with our safety and security consultants at Altaris. We also understand that the FBI is aware of these threats and has not found evidence to suggest they are specific

While we do not believe there is an actual safety threat, the immediacy of social media and the algorithms used to promote certain content mean that many of our students are seeing these upsetting and

potentially traumatizing posts in real time. We are asking for your partnership in speaking with your children about avoiding and sharing any such videos and actively monitoring your children's use of social media. Digital literacy has become an important focus of our educational program as we seek to provide students the tools they need to promote positive civic engagement and compassion for others. Among the applicable lessons that are woven into our curriculum in developmentally appropriate ways are the ideas that:

Around the globe, there are many people who are diligently working to solve differences peacefully.

Treating others with kindness and respect, regardless of differences, is a pillar of our community. In fact, kindness, empathy and understanding each play a critical role in promoting peace and safety.

These skills are critically important in times such as these and we are grateful for your help in reinforcing those messages.


Pelham Memorial High School is proud to announce PMHS Senior James Blackburn earned a PERFECT score on last year's AP Computer Science Principles Exam.

FACT OR FICTION? BINGE DRINKING

One in a series of Project Community articles to provide teens and families with information and programs they need before tragedy strikes.

Fact: "You can drown in a teaspoon of water with alcohol toxicity."

Alcohol depresses the gag reflex. The gag reflex guards the lungs from food or drink and consequently directs food to the esophagus and stomach. When the gag reflex is depressed even a small amount of water can cause drowning.

Fiction: "At the hospital, ones stomach is pumped to prevent the life-threatening effects of alcohol poisoning."

The stomach is **not** pumped because alcohol is absorbed directly into the bloodstream and is dispersed throughout the body's organs. The progression of alcohol on the brain is: buzzed-forebrain, wasted-midbrain, dead-brain stem. The brainstem controls breathing and cardiac function.

Fall Leaf Collection Has Begun



The Village Department of Public Works is ready for seasonal leaf cleanup. Every year, the Department of Public Works collects approximately 1,200 tons of fall leaves and yard debris. The 2023 Fall Leaf Collection Program began on October 15, 2023, and continue through December 15, 2023.

DO'S AND DON'TS

ъ.

- Pile leaves neatly on the grass near the edge of the road/curbline
- Only pile leaves, nothing else, all other organics must be bagged
- Keep the leaf piles on your own property
- Use biodegradable paper bags only for yard waste (grass clippings, twigs, dead plants, etc.) All tree brush must be tied separately

and placed curbside with yard waste for collection.

DONT'S:

- Place leaves in the roadway which can create traffic safety issues
- Block any walkways/sidewalks with leaf piles
- Place grass clippings, branches, or any other material with the leaves
- Pile leaves near fire hydrants, storm drain catch basins, or near corners where they can create a visual obstruction or block the flow of stormwater to the catch basin, causing localized flooding
- Place leaf piles over items that can cause damage, such as roadside boulders, gravel driveways/walkways, landscape lights, sprinkler heads, etc.

Residents should put leaves at the curb or edge of the street (not in the street) and should NOT be commingled with brush and pine needles.

All loose leaves and bagged organics are to be placed curbside between March 15th and April 30th and again between October 15th and December 15th. The Village Public Works Department picks up every day and works its way around the Village picking up a section at a time on a revolving basis. No pick up after Dec.15th. After December 15th items must be held until pickup begins again on March 15th. Do not mix twigs, branches, rubbish, or any other materials in the leaf piles as they contaminate the piles and they will not be accepted at the organic waste site.

Gas-Powered Leaf Blowers: The Village does not allow gas-powered leaf blowers to be used from May 1st to October 14th and from December 16th to March 14th. Violations by a property owner or your lawn maintenance provider can result in enforcement action against the property owner including a \$250.00 fine, by Village Police. Please use the attached flyer to distribute to property owners or lawn maintenance providers.

Christmas trees are picked up curbside from December 26th to January 31st only. Trees must be bare of all ornaments, lights, and stands, with no garlands, and no wreaths. Trees wrapped in garbage bags will not be picked up.

No organic pick-up between December 15th and March 15th. Items must be held.

of the program, Daniel Goldin, came to visit him in the hospital. Melvin was sure that his dream to walk in space had ended, but Goldin assured him that just as NASA had never given up on the Hubbel telescope, he would never give up on Melvin.

Although Melvin was still medically disqualified from flying in space, things changed for him again after the Space Shuttle Columbia was destroyed when it returned to Earth. Melvin had regained partial hearing in one ear, and yet another "man in the yellow hat," the chief of all flight surgeons believed in Melvin and cleared him medically. Melvin was assigned to the Space Shuttle Atlantis. Its mission was to install a laboratory at the International Space Station. While at the space station, Melvin had dinner with Russian and German astronauts, and his perspective changed as he and the others viewed the Earth, spoke of their hometowns, and "connected with all those who are, were, and will be."

He ended his talk by encouraging the kids in the audience to never give up and keep going. "Believe in yourself, and listen to your parents and teachers."

Dr. Tom Callahan, Director of Math and Science and Dr. Kim Riegel, a community member and founder of the nonprofit MINDSET, provided an overview of the new community-wide STEM collaboration centered around the book "Chasing Space." Similar to "The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind" initiative two years ago, this effort will focus on K-12 activities that integrate STEM and the humanities and include a number of community activities.


