September 11th Memorial Service



Multiple Resolutions Outlined at Village **Board Meeting**

Village of Pelham Mayor Chance Mullen called the August 12th Board of Trustees Meeting to order, beginning with Trustee Reports.

Trustee Theresa Mohan noted that the Natural Resources Inventory that the Board has been working on since February is in draft form and will be presented at the September meeting, adding that the 9/11 Commemoration will take place on Thursday, September 11th at the Town's 9/11 Memorial on Harmon Avenue at 8:30 a.m.

Trustee Russell Solomon said that he was in contact with the Complete Streets Grant Program, with \$15 million available through Westchester County Capital Budget Fund BPL39 to assist municipalities with design and implementation of Complete Streets projects on municipal roads; deadline is Friday, September 19th. "Administrator Chris Scelza and I met with CivicPlus, cloud-based software which will allow us to house agendas, minutes and videos; timeline December/ January," Solomon added.

Scelza remarked that fieldwork for the FY25 audit has been completed and will be presented to the Board in October. "We also completed our 2025 repaving, portions of Corlies Avenue, Nyack Avenue, Sixth Avenue, Third Street and substantial parking lot rehabilitation behind

the Municipal Center. The only remaining items are the vehicular membrane applied to the 2nd Floor Parking Deck, when the weather cools down, hopefully in September.

"The Department of Public Works is re-striping sidewalks and parking tees," Scelza concluded.

David Cooper, representing Pelham Green2 LLC stated that there are certain sewer and stormwater management improvements, associated with the mixed-use development across the street from Village right-of-way. "There are two stormwater management separators that will be underneath the sidewalk, signing and finishing up the review process with the County.'

Resolutions included authorizing the promotion of Joseph Larios to Motor Equipment Operator; appointment of Anthony Ibarra as Laborer in DPW and the promotion of Vincent Pizzutiello from Laborer to Laborer with Special Skills.

Another Resolution authorized execution of an agreement with NYS Energy Research and Development Authority for a \$236,087 Grant to purchase electric vehicles, electric off-road utility vehicles, electric landscaping equipment and establishing Capital Project.

A final Resolution authorized Village Clerk Adriana Rugova to attend the New York Conference of Mayors (NYCOM) Fall Training School.

machines that had reached the end of their useful life, were auctioned off, and the proceeds were put toward the purchase of this replacement.

The Kubota operates with four wheels, rather than the track system that the Bombardier had, making it much nimbler to operate. The Kubota also provides greater control over the plow blade. Additionally, there are numerous attachments that are available for this machine.

With the initial purchase, they



secured the salt spreader, auger, fork lift, and bucket attachments. All of these attachments are interchangeable. This upgrade also provides operating efficiencies as it is able to be utilized year-round for operations such as sidewalk replacements, tree maintenance, and other general grounds maintenance operations.

Councilwoman McLoughlin Cites Highly Successful Camp Summer, Extensive Town Senior Program

Pelham Town Supervisor Daniel J. McLaughlin convened the August 11th Council meeting, beginning with Deputy Supervisor Rae Szymanski's Emergency Medical Services Report (EMS). "For the month of July there were 44 calls in the Village of Pelham, 42 in the Village of Pelham Manor, one on I-95, six on the Hutch, two in Eastchester, one in Tuckahoe and one in the Bronx. Response time was 5 minutes, 7 seconds; on scene time, 17 minutes; transport time, 12 minutes, six seconds; turnaround time, 30 minutes, 6 seconds."

Space Update: "As of July 31st, we closed down the Pelham Manor flycar facility. We now have the flycar, ambulance and personnel here," McLaughlin said.

In the Recreation Report, Councilwoman Kara McLoughlin noted a very successful camp summer, with lots of positive comments. Registration for fall programs will open soon and there will be a Mobile App. Monday night concerts at Gazebo Park will continue through September 8th, another concert or two may be added due to rainouts.

McLoughlin added that Town se-

niors have been kept busy with Pelham Together Pelicones, bingo, arts and crafts, exercise, yoga plus shopping trips to Arthur Avenue.

Councilwoman Kristen Burke reported that the Courts "This year the court was open one week in July, another in August." A new system for processing traffic ticket payments has been instituted by the Village of Pelham; also notices have been sent out for people possessing unpaid tickets five years and older.

Burke went on to say that Town Justice Adam Kagan received \$42,570 in June; \$11,880 in July; Justice John P. Gardner received \$31,003 in June, \$48,835

Regarding the NewYork State Energy Research and Development Authority Grant, Burke stated that the consultants were incorporating comments and edits into the draft; Burke and McLaughlin will engage in discussions with the two vendors. Grants must be applied for by September 25th.

Finally, McLaughlin discussed the installation of a Town Hall elevator to be placed outside, being less disruptive to the inside of the building, not having to open up the roof.

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Property Maintenance Code Community Outreach

It is a beautiful time of year to walk the Village and enjoy time outdoors. However, local officials would like to take a moment to remind homeowners of their duty to make sure their property is maintained in compliance with our local municipal code. This is especially important as school being is back in session and children are walking to school.

As stewards of the community, the Village of Pelham Manor's operations staff is tasked with enforcing local municipal codes uniformly for all property owners and on public lands. The local Chapter 157 Property Maintenance is the legislative text that governs how properties must be maintained. The regulations are quite similar, and in some instances exactly the same, as neighboring and nearby municipalities.

Everyone is proud to have such a walkable community and ask that all residents do their part to make sure everyone is comfortable walking around the Village. As explained in the Purpose section (§ 157-3Purpose.) of the property maintenance code, the provisions are intended to establish reasonable safeguards for the safety, health, and welfare of the general public. Communicable diseases are always a concern, especially ones that can be spread through insects.

According to the New York State Department of Health (NYS DOH), deer ticks live in shady, moist areas at ground level and are commonly found in our lawns and shrubs. Ticks will cling to tall grass, brush, and shrubs, usually no more than 18-24 inches off the ground. The NYS DOH recommends the following precautions to greatly reduce the tick population:


- Keep grass mowed.
- Remove leaf litter, brush and weeds at the edge of the lawn.
- Restrict the use of groundcover, such as pachysandra in areas frequented by family and roaming pets.
- Remove brush and leaves around stonewalls and wood piles.
- Trim tree branches and shrubs around the lawn edge to let in more sunlight.

The NYS DOH also lists similar recommendations to reduce the mosquito population around your home:

- Drill holes in the bottoms of recycling containers that are kept outdoors.
- Make sure roof gutters drain properly and clean clogged gutters in the spring and fall.
- Remove leaf debris from yards and gardens.
- Landscape to eliminate standing water that collects on your property.



Dylan Gurl Commissioned as Officer in Marine Corps

Dylan M. Gurl of Pelham, was commissioned as a United States Marine Corps Second Lieutenant on May 15th, 2025 in Williamsburg, Virginia.

Gurl, a dual economics and public policy major, was one of nine William & Mary College graduates who took the Army and Marine Corps oaths of office in a commissioning ceremony occurring on commencement weekend.

William & Mary College President Katherine Rowe and Chancellor Robert Gates, a former Director of the Central Intelligence Agency and Secretary of Defense, presided.

In September, Dylan will report to Quantico, Virginia to attend the Marine Corps officer training course called The Basic School (TBS).

TBS is six months of all-around combat training that teaches newly-commissioned 2nd Lieutenants skills like leading combat fire teams, weapons qualifications, and land navigation.

After completing TBS, 2nd Lieutenants receive at least three additional months of training in a chosen specialty (e.g. Infantry, Field Artillery, Intelligence, Aviation, etc.). Upon completion of his

training Dylan, who wishes to serve as an infantry officer, will be assigned to a post and begin his four-year active-duty commitment.

This will be Dylan's second stint at Quantico; he spent last summer completing the grueling 10-week USMC Officers Candidate School program there.

Pelham Memorial High School Graduate

Dylan, son of Anthea Perkinson and Shaun Gurl, grew up in Pelham and graduated from Pelham Memorial High School in 2019.

At PMHS, Dylan held leadership roles in the band and the Military History Club, was a member of the National Honor Society and received both the Campbell Whitford Scholarship Award and the Lt. Joseph G. Leavey Memorial Scholarship upon graduation. He was also an active member of the Boy Scouts Troop 1 as Senior Patrol Leader and later earned the rank of Eagle Scout.

When Covid disrupted his freshman year in college, Dylan put his studies on hold. He first worked in a warehouse and as a school janitor. He then was accepted into the AmeriCorps National Civil Community Corps and performed service projects in communities throughout the Midwest. Dylan subsequently joined the AmeriCorps City Year program for six months, working long but fulfilling days as a teacher's aide and after-school program manager in a public middle school in the Bronx.

Family Footsteps

Dylan is following in the footsteps of his grandfather, John T. Gurl, who graduated from Officer Candidate School in Quantico in 1959 and was commissioned as a Marine Corps officer upon his own college graduation in 1960. John Gurl spent six years on active duty as a Marine Corps aviator before becoming a commercial airline pilot with Eastern Air Lines. Gurl continued to serve as a pilot in the USMC Reserves, eventually retiring with the rank of Major.

Commissioning Ceremony Traditions

Dylan's May 15th 2025 commissioning ceremony highlighted several traditions. One is "pinning". As each new officer was introduced, family members were invited on-stage to pin 2nd lieutenant bars onto the new officer's uniform epaulets for the first time. Dylan asked his parents to pin his bars.

The second tradition honored is "first salute". Each new officer receives the initial salutes of their military careers from a chosen enlisted member of the armed services. This honor is given to someone who has been a significant sup-

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

What Happens in New York if You Die Without a Will?

Thinking about death is never pleasant, but understanding what happens to your money, home, and belongings if you pass away without a Last Will and Testament is important for protecting your loved ones. In New York, dying without a valid will is called dying "intestate." When that happens, state law—not you—decides who inherits your property. The rules are set out in the New York Estates, Powers and Trusts Law (EPTL), and they may not match your wishes.

When a person dies intestate in New York, the process is handled through the Surrogate's Court in the county where they lived. The court appoints someone to manage the estate—called the "administrator." This person collects the deceased's assets, pays outstanding debts and taxes, and then distributes what remains to the heirs determined by law. The law creates a family tree of priority, starting with the closest living relatives.

Here is how the basic inheritance order works in New York:

• If you leave a spouse and no chil-

dren: Your spouse inherits everything.

- If you leave children but no spouse: Your children inherit everything, divided equally. If a child has died before you but left their own children (your grandchildren), that share passes down to them.
- If you leave both a spouse and children: Your spouse inherits the first \$50,000 plus half of the remaining estate. Your children inherit the other half, divided equally.
- If you have no spouse and no children: Your estate passes to your parents.
- If your parents have died: Your estate passes to your siblings (or their descendants if they have died).
- If there are no surviving immediate relatives, the inheritance can go further out to nieces, nephews, grandparents, aunts, uncles, and cousins. If no family members can be found, your estate eventually goes to the State of New York.

These rules apply only to assets that are considered part of your "probate estate." Certain property passes automatically outside of the intestacy process—such as jointly owned property with rights of survivorship, life insurance proceeds with a named beneficiary, and retirement accounts with designated beneficiaries.

Dying without a will can create challenges. First, you lose control over who receives your property. You cannot leave specific gifts to friends, charities, or unmarried partners, because New York's intestacy law recognizes only spouses, blood relatives and legally adopted children as heirs. Stepchildren do not inherit unless legally adopted, no matter how close your relationship was.

You also cannot choose who will handle your estate—New York law sets the order of priority for who may serve as administrator, and it might not be the person you would have picked.

The intestacy process can also be slower and more costly. Family members may disagree about who should be in charge or how property should be handled. If no close relatives are available, the Public Administrator's office may have to take over, adding another layer of bureaucracy.

Creating a will is not only about distributing your assets—it's about reducing stress for your loved ones. A properly drafted and executed will in New York allows you to:

- Choose exactly who inherits your property and in what amounts.
 - Name an executor you trust to

manage your estate.

- Appoint guardians for minor children.
- Provide for non-relatives or charities.

Without a will, your legacy is left to a set of rigid legal rules. While these rules aim to be fair, they cannot reflect your personal values, relationships, or intentions. By taking the time to prepare a will, you ensure that your wishes—not the default laws—guide the distribution of your life's work.

In short, if you live in New York, dying without a will means the state will write one for you—and you might not like what it says. The best way to protect your loved ones, your property, and your peace of mind is to plan ahead. Consulting with an experienced estate planning attorney can help you create a clear, valid, and enforceable plan that speaks for you when you no longer can.

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
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
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


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
